

It's been called the City That Never Sleeps, the Urban Jungle, and—by its more than 8 million current residents—home. No matter the moniker, New York City has been one of the world's most influential metropolises for more than 200 years. From the top of the Empire State Building to the deepest underground subway tunnels, this ever-evolving wonderland is an unmatched cultural center, with new places waiting to be discovered around every corner. We asked the experts for their thoughts about the Big Apple.

# What distinguishes New York from other major world cities?

MR. HARPER: "While other great cities—Chicago, London, Tokyo, Hong Kong, Shanghai—have their impressive skyscrapers, I can think of no other place that has such an almost overwhelming density of them. Navigating the streets of Midtown has been likened to journeying through a series of canyons. It oddly reminds me more of hiking through the great redwood forests of America's West Coast."

HARPER ALLIANCE PARTNERS: "The diversity of all walks of life is what I feel distinguishes NYC from other major world cities, as well as having basically everything you need at your fingertips," says Matt Moore, front office manager at The Greenwich Hotel. Adds Maureen Stella, director of sales and marketing at The Carlyle, "New York City, more than any other city in the world, has a significant impact on global commerce, finance, media, culture, art, fashion and entertainment, and it is home to the United Nations."

## What do you love most about New York City?

**MR. HARPER:** "The boundless sense of life, purpose, energy and possibility."

HARPER ALLIANCE PARTNERS: "I truly think the people here are what I love most," says Halleluyah Walcott, evening duty manager at The Greenwich Hotel. "The melting pot aspect makes it a wonderful

place to experience and learn from a multitude of people and cultures." Philip Truelove, general manager at The Greenwich Hotel, agrees. "The diversity of NYC is the one overall aspect that I appreciate and love the most about the city. The people, the food, the entertainment, the shopping—and all of this 24 hours a day."

## What activities and attractions should all visitors make sure to see or do at least once?

MR. HARPER: "I'm going to direct you to roads well traveled, but: the top of the Empire State Building; the Statue of Liberty; a cruise around Manhattan, starting while it's still light, ending when you can see the island all aglow; The Metropolitan Museum of Art; Central Park; a Broadway show; a performance at Carnegie Hall; a sandwich at a New York deli (try the Carnegie Deli in Midtown); dim sum in Chinatown (try the **Golden** Unicorn); a visit to Rockefeller **Center**, preferably at Christmas; a drink at the '21' Club and The Oak Bar at The Plaza Hotel; window shopping on West 57th Street, Fifth Avenue, Madison Avenue, Bleecker Street, SoHo; eating a sidewalk hot dog; asking a New Yorker for directions."

Stella recommends The Carlyle's own Café Carlyle, the "White House" of cabaret entertainment. "You can get up close and personal with performing stars such as Woody Allen, [who appears here] every Monday night, Elaine Stritch, Judy Collins, Steve Tyrell. You can recapture a moment in time and engage in the lost language of elegance and sophistication."

# Describe a perfect day in NYC. Does it change with the seasons?

MR. HARPER: "A good breakfast, perhaps a pretzel croissant and a cup of incomparably thick hot chocolate at City Bakery, a visit to the farmers' market at Union Square, and a leisurely window-shopping stroll followed by lunch. Then a movie or a museum visit, back to the hotel to change, and then a smart cocktail followed by dinner."

## From street vendors to 12-course tasting menus, New York City spans the culinary spectrum. What are your favorite dining options?

MR. HARPER: "There is no question that New York is one of the culinary capitals of the world. The variety is stunning, from the simple to the sophisticated. Here are some of my favorites: I have liked Gramercy **Tavern** since its opening, when star Tom Colicchio was the chef. I also greatly admire Daniel Boulud, whose Daniel is an elegant showcase for his superb French food. Also, I never miss a chance to dine at La Gre**nouille**, which has excellent classic French food and a setting that is the prettiest in New York. For Italian, I love Mario Batali's Babbo, with the proviso that you book upstairs and

avoid the clamor of the downstairs bar. I have also thoroughly enjoyed the Roman trattoria fare and lively atmosphere at Danny Meyer's Maialino. For an elegant Chinese meal, I opt for Chin Chin or Michael Tong's Shun Lee. I will kick the hornet's nest once again and state that, for its atmosphere and its food, **Keens** is my steakhouse of choice in the city. Two other conversation starters in NYC: best pizza and best burger. John's gets my vote for best pizza; it's flavorful and thin-crusted. And **The Crosby Bar** at the **Crosby** Street Hotel has what I find to be the best hamburger in New York."



My favorite part of the park is the walk around the pond at the southeast corner. And my favorite city oasis is the stunning little vest-pocket Paley Park, once site of the legendary Stork Club and now a lovely escape with seating, a waterfall and a small refreshment stand."
