### Art in Bloom

Two bronze sculptures placed in a garden-like setting, complete with real plants and flowers, welcome visitors to the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts' exhibit, "The Artist's Garden: American Impressionism and the Garden Movement, 1887-1920." This colorful collection, on view through May 24, includes pieces by artists like J. Alden Weir, Violet Oakley, and William Merritt Chase.

Through a stunning collection of paintings, sculpture, books and stained glass, "The Artist's Garden" explores the intertwining stories of Impressionism and the growing popularity of gardening in America during the Progressive Era, and highlights the Philadelphia region's role in the national garden movement. The Colonial Revival Garden movement originated at the World's Fair in Philadelphia in 1876, and the Garden Club of America was established here in 1913.



# Pretty City Parks

Enjoy Philadelphia's lush public squares this spring. Along the Benjamin Franklin Parkway, Logan Circle (200 N. 19th St.) is just steps from iconic sites like the Philadelphia Museum of Art and The Franklin Institute. Trendy shops, upscale hotels and chef-driven restaurants surround Rittenhouse Square (18th and Walnut streets). Benches line the park's walkways that crisscross throughout green space, which hosts art exhibitions, concerts and other events year-round. Moving east, Washington Square (Sixth and Walnut streets) spans more than six acres. The lawns bustle with locals, often accompanied by their companions. Kids love to ride the Parx Liberty Carousel in Franklin Square (200 Sixth St.) a family-friendly haven in Old City. After a round of Philly-themed mini-golf, visitors can grab a bite at Stephen Starr's casual take-out spot SquareBurger.
